I. DESCRIPTION

A study of each book of the New Testament. Emphasis is placed on an understanding of the background of the author and the writing of each book, as well as key elements such as its theme, key verse, and key words. The contents of each book are studied in summary form. A survey of the intertestamental period is also included. (Prerequisite: BI115)

* This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

- 3. Explain the arguments of the Pauline epistles (Romans-Philemon) and the General Epistles (Hebrews-Jude) (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 2, 4, 5, 6, 8)
- 4. Identify the major people in the New Testament and their significance (PLO 1, 2) (A 1, 2, 5, 6)
- 5. Explain what the New Testament (especially the book of Revelation) reveals about the future (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 5, 6, 8)
- 6.Learn how to create PowerPoint slides that communicate a New Testament book (PLO 1, 2, 5) (A 3, 5, 6)
- 7. Discover applications for life from the New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 5) (A 5, 7)

III. TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Assignment 1: Read Gromacki pages 1-66 (Backgrounds, Introduction, Gospels). In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading (33 points)

Assignment 2: Read Matthew-Mark. Read Gromacki pages 67-108. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 3: Read Luke-John. Read Gromacki pages 109-148. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 4: Put together 50 slides on one of the gospels. The 50 slides must include: title slide, author, recipients, date and place of writing, theme, purposes, key verses with pictures, outline of the NT book, and maps/charts (103 points)

Assignment 5: Read Acts, Galatians, and 1-2 Thessalonians. Read Gromacki pages 149-175; 227-240; 276-290. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 6: Read Romans-2 Corinthians. Read Gromacki pages 176-226. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 7: Answer questions 1-10 in Discussions. Interact in a discussion board with at least one other student (100 points)

Assignment 8: Read Ephesians-Philippians. Read Gromacki pages 241-265. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 9: Take Exam #1 over the Intertestamental Period, Introduction to the Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke, John and the book of Acts. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. No helps can be used when you take the exam (100 points)

Assignment 10:. Read Colossians/1-2 Timothy-Philemon. Read Gromacki pages 266-274/291-318. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 11: Take Exam #2 over these Pauline Epistles (Galatians, 1 and 2 Thessalonians, 1 and 2 Corinthians and Romans). There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. No helps can be used when you take this exam (100 points)

Assignment 12: Read Hebrews-3 John. Read Gromacki pages 319-384. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 13: Read Jude-Revelation. Read Gromacki pages 417-451. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (33 points)

Assignment 14: Take Exam #3 over the Prison Epistles (Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon) and the Pastoral Epistles of Paul (1 Timothy, Titus, 2 Timothy). There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. No helps can be used when you take this exam (100 points)

Assignment 15: Answer questions 11-20 in Discussions. Interact in a discussion board with at least one other student (100 points)

Assignment 16: Take Exam #4 over the General Epistles (Hebrews-Jude) and the book of Revelation. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. No helps can be used when you take this exam (100 points).
