This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

I. Description

A systematic analysis of the book of Romans, highlighting the outworking of God's righteousness in His plan of salvation. Each student is required to master the argument of Romans as a solid foundation for Christian living and service. (Prerequisite: BI115)

II. Objectives

- A. The student will be able to identify all of the following facts about the book of Romans:
 1. Basic Facts about the Book. This includes its author, recipients, date, occasion, theme, purpose, and structure. (PLO's: 1, 2) (Assignments: A-D)
 2. Basic Facts within the Book (the chapter from which selected basic statements come). (PLO's: 1, 2) (Assignments: A-D):
- B. The student will demonstrate the ability to do all of the following:
 1. Explain why selected interpretive problems need to be solved (PLO's: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (Assignments: A-D).
 2. Critically evaluate alternative solutions to these problems (PLO's: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (Assignments: A-D).

3. Derive and justify your own tentative solutions to these problems (PLO's: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (Assignments: A-D).
4. Identify the basic questions that the book addresses and the answers it provides. (PLO's: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (Assignment: A-D)
5. Trace the overall structure of the book's argument. (PLO's: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (Assignment: A-D)
6. Propose practical—and interpretively sound—applications of the book. (PLO's: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (Assignment: C)

III. Textbooks

- A. *Holy Bible*. The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (paraphrases and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask me if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

IV. Assignments

- A. **Reading** (240 points possible; 30 each week): The student will read the Book of Romans, a textbook and various articles related to particular interpretive issues in Romans.
- B. **Weekly Quizzes** (240 points possible; 30 each week): To reinforce the key ideas presented in the classroom discussions.
- C. **Study Projects** (320 points possible; 40 each week): To reinforce the skills learned in BI115 Hermeneutics and Bible Study Methods, the student will have weekly study projects that must be done according to instructions and order in Canvas.
- D. **Overview Chart** (200 points possible): Create a chart of the entire Book of Romans according to the format explained in class and Canvas.
