COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines the historical backgrounds, arguments, biblical theology, and interpretive issues in the Prophets section of the Hebrew Bible. Students will study the history of Israel in its Ancient Near Eastern context and see how God blessed and judged the nation of Israel based on their obedience or disobedience to the Mosaic covenant. Students will study the Messianic prophecies in these books and do exegetical studies in the Hebrew text of these Old Testament books.

This is a blended class, meaning that both campus and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. All interaction and assignments for campus and online students are done in the online classroom.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The student who successfully completes this course should . . .

- 1. Strengthen proficiency in biblical Hebrew and develop exegetical skills in the Hebrew text (PLO 1) (A 1-7)
- 2. Understand the literary structure, major themes, and theology of the Prophetic Books, including the inter-textual relationship of each book with other books in the canon (PLO 2) (A 1-7)
- 3. Develop an understanding of the nature and development of the Abrahamic Covenant, Mosaic Covenant, and Davidic Covenant in the Hebrew canon, and the prophetic history of the nation of Israel (PLO 2, 4) (A1-7)

- 4. Develop an understanding of the eschatological and messianic teaching in the Prophetic Books (PLO 2, 4) (A1-7)
- 5. Articulate the basic literary structure and message of the Prophetic books (PLO 2) (A1-7)
- 6. Learn from and interact with past and contemporary scholarship in the field (PLO 4) (A1-7)
- 7. Apply teachings from the Prophetic Books to their life and ministry (PLO 3) (A1-7)

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1 – The student will read *The Literary Structure of the Old Testament* by David Dorsey on the Hebrew books covered in class and write a book review (4 pages double spaced) (100 points)

Assignment 2 – The student will read *The Moody Handbook of Messianic Prophecy* on the Prophetic books and write a book review (4 pages double spaced) (100 points)

Assignment 3 – The student will read *The Message of the Prophets* by Daniel Hays and write a book review (4 pages double spaced). **(100 points)**

Assignment 4 – The student will give a 30–45 minute presentation in class on a Hebrew text from the Prophets section of the Hebrew Bible. The text from the Hebrew Bible will be selected by the professor. (100 points)

Assignment 5 – The student will answer questions in Discussions (200 points)

Assignment 6 – The student will write a 25–30 page Hebrew exeges paper on a text from the Hebrew Bible selected by the student and approved by the professor. The research paper must follow Turabian style. (300 points)

Assignment 7 – The student will present a 30 minute lecture using Powerpoint on the Hebrew exegesis paper to the professor and students in the final class (100 points)
