Course: CO436-N: Death, Dying and Grief Counseling (Online Only)

**Credit:** 3 Semester hours

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#### I. DESCRIPTION

The course is designed to help the student understand the various dynamics of death, dying, and grief through a conscientious study of God's Word (Prerequisite: CO244)

Students will be exposed to sensitive subject matter throughout this course. It will be important to demonstrate self-awareness and sensitivity while engaging in this material.

This course includes both in-person and online students together. In-person students attend classes in person, online students attend the class via the online classroom (Canvas). All interaction and assignments for in-person and online students are done in the online classroom (Canvas).

#### II. OBJECTIVES

# A. General competencies to be achieved:

- 1. Students will learn the Biblical worldview of death, dying, and grief (PLO 1, 2).
- 2. Students will learn a Biblical approach to caring for the grieving person (PLO 3, 4, 5, 6).
- 3. The student will receive practical tools for caring for counselees through the grieving process (PLO 3, 4, 5, 6).
- 4. Students will learn how to assess the spiritual and physical needs of those facing death, dying, and grief situations (PLO 3, 4, 5, 6).

# B. Specific competencies to be achieved:

- 1. Students will be able to articulate the Biblical worldview of death, dying, and grief (PLO 1, 2).
- 2. Students will demonstrate an ability to communicate the Biblical worldview of death, dying, and grief response through appropriate evangelism and discipleship ministry (PLO 3, 4, 5, 6).
- 3. Students will demonstrate an ability to utilize the Biblical approach in caring for those facing death, dying and grief situations (PLO 3, 4, 5, 6).

# III. REQUIREMENTS

### A. Reading Assignments

Note: Use as a textbook in this class does not imply full approval of author's viewpoint(s). Students are expected to evaluate the content of textbooks through the lens of Scripture. Students will be accountable for reading as posted in the assignments schedule and for reading content covered in quizzes.

# **B.** Written Assignments

- 1. Position Papers (GC 1, 2; SC 1, 2)
  - Students will write two original papers in APA Style 7<sup>th</sup> edition. Each paper will be five pages long (excluding cover page and bibliography) and will include a minimum of four sources (Scripture, 1 textbook, 1 other book, 1 journal).
    - a. Biblical Examples of Grief
    - b. Biblical Theology of Death
- 2. Scenario Case Study Papers (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3)

Students will write two original papers following the template provided in Canvas. Each paper will be two pages long and based on a case study of the following scenarios. One page will be dedicated to assessment, assumptions, questions, and assumption of needs and the second page will be dedicated to a plan of proposed ministry and support for specific needs identified in the assessment.

- a. Scenario Paper 1= Medical Death (example: long-term/terminal illness)
- b. Scenario Paper 2 = Traumatic Death (example: accident, violence, suicide)

## 3. Interview (GC 2, 3, 4; SC 2, 3)

Students will conduct one interview and write a five-page assessment, reflection, and proposal of care that could/should have been provided in that specific instance. The interview is designed to allow the student to interact with others that have faced the challenges addressed in this course. Further instruction and templates will be provided by the instructor.

# 4. Discussion Posts and Responses (GC 1, 2, 4; SC 1, 2, 3)

Students will participate in six discussion posts on Canvas. Each post will interact around four things for discussion: (1) Summary of content including author's/presenter's theme and main point, (2) An assessment of how the content does/does not reflect the Biblical worldview, (3) Highlights the student found in the material, and (4) Specific aspects that can be used to build a Biblical counseling approach from the material presented.

- a. Selected chapter from Powlison Text
- b. Supplemental Video 1
- c. Selected chapter from Guthrie Text
- d. Selected chapter from Alcorn Text
- e. Supplemental Video 2
- f. Selected chapter from Erickson-Tada Text

# C. Quizzes (GC 1, 2; SC 1, 2)

Two quizzes will cover content from class lectures, assigned readings, and supplemental videos.
