This course will train students in technique that mentally and physically communicates the spoken text in effective and dynamic ways.

Attendance Policy: Day Classes

- Calvary University has no official attendance policy. Students are responsible to the class instructor for work missed during an absence for any cause. When classes are missed due to official school sponsored events or functions the sponsoring faculty should submit a list of affected students to the Academic Office who will then make the list available to all instructors to verify excused absences.
- Class Withdrawal: in no case is the cessation of class attendance taken as an intent to withdraw from or drop a course. Written Assignments are due via email by midnight of the date assigned, but preferably by class time. Papers and reading assignments must be completed on time. Work not completed on time will be graded down accordingly. A paper or written assignment will go down one full grade for every week that it is late. After that time, it will receive no credit. Illness or a registrar-granted leave of absence are the only acceptable exceptions.

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
