began in education, Matt now holds the role of Wealth Solutions Officer at Equity Bank, Trust and Wealth Management. When reflecting on if he felt called to his career path, Matt stated: "I've never believed that the will of God for my life was some mystic thing I hoped I didn't miss. God's plan for my life is to walk in obedience and fellowship with Him each day. For me, success is found in the stewardship of where God has placed me."


As stated earlier, Matt has led a diverse career life. He grew up in Christian schooling and was deeply impacted by Christian teachers, so he pursued a career in education. His first professional job was as a mathematics instructor and coach at Blue Ridge Christian School (1986-1991), where he learned the important lessons of setting an example and being intentional in his work, family, and spiritual life. After a few years of working as a supervisor for his father's construction business, Matt delved deeper into business when he accepted a sales and marketing position at Tomkins Industries (1993-1998) and eventually a position as Operations Manager (1998-2000).

Tomkins was where Matt transformed into a proactive leader through volunteering to do difficult tasks no one else wanted to do, and going out of his way to challenge himself, even when he had to learn new skills. After helping Tomkins expand greatly, Matt returned to the field of education, where he worked at Kansas City Christian School (2000-2005) as the high school principal. There, Matt applied newly acquired skills from his previous job at Tomkins, taking part in financial responsibilities as well as thriving in his position of leadership where he put his relational competency and passion for coaching to great use.

The question Jesus asked in Matthew 16:15, "Who do you say that I am?" (ESV), seems simple enough to answer. Peter's answer is memorable: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). Yet, the answer given to that question over the past ten years in faith-based higher education institutions where I have served has been remarkably inadequate and confusing. A wrong answer on this question does not result in failing a class, it results in the damnation of the soul.

The answers I have received from hundreds of students are more akin to the "God" of Moralistic Therapeutic Deism, as opposed to the God of

the Bible. The term comes from a landmark book written by Christian Smith and Melina Lundquist Deaton, entitled Soul Searching: The Religious and Spiritual Lives of American Teenagers (Oxford University Press, 2005). In the research, the authors uncovered these five central tenets: 1) A god exists who created and ordered the world and watches over human life on earth; 2) God wants people to be good, nice, and fair to each other, as taught in the Bible and by most world religions; 3) The central goal of life is to be happy and to feel good about one's self; 4) God does not need to be particularly involved in one's life except when God is needed to resolve a problem; and 5) Good people go to heaven when they die. I heard these terms and vocabulary similarly expressed those students who would consider themselves wholehearted followers of Christ, and from those whose attachment to Christianity was marginal at best. This is a great concern.

When the Residence Life student leadership approached me during

the summer about adopting the question as the theme for the academic year, I was wholeheartedly in agreement. My enthusiasm increased as it was shared that the answer to that question would be provided through a year-long study of the gospel of John. John provides the intent of his writing in John 20:31, which serves as our theme verse: "these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name." (ESV).

for being poor, the Macedonian believers' generosity began with committing their very lives to service by offering any personal help they could give. It is only through God's grace that the Macedonian believers responded in the way that they did.

The second verse identifies financial generosity in the midst of a severe test of economic affliction. The comparison then, for certain individuals or even societies, is not a

difficult one. It should be a challenge to the western society reader. If the Macedonians, in their circumstances could set aside, what does that say about what I/we/you can do?

This passage is notable in that Paul never mentions the amount that was set aside. Only that they had set aside **John McGee** Chie**CDief@petept**ment a gift to help the struggling brothers Officefficer and sisters in lerusalem. What he

does say is that they overflowed in a "wealth of generosity on their part".

In western culture with bank accounts, money market accounts, insurance plans, plans for the future, rainy day savings, set aside for this need, planning for that want, we often miss the opportunity to simply trust God, to lean on him for the needs of today and tomorrow.

Our prayer for you as you consider the challenge of II Corinthians 8 is that God's magnificent and abundant grace would manifest itself in your response, so God's glory would be seen and understood.

Then in 2005, Matt and his wife, Mary, made a huge career shift. After deciding they wanted to enter a ministry role, they sold everything they owned and began raising support for a ministry career at Ethnos 360's Faith Academy in the Philippines. Within six months, they raised their supports, "stepped out in faith", and moved to the Philippines with their three children. After three years on the mission field, where Matt faithfully served as an educator, advisor, and leader, he and his family moved back to the states in 2007. When Trinity Academy offered him a position as principal of the school (2007-2017), he accepted.

During his ten years at Trinity, Matt held many positions of leadership in the school, including administration, development, academics, and student life. While there, he discovered his passion for "building" organizations, as well as people. When he resigned from Christian education in 2017,

> So far as the future is concerned, Matt believes the best years of his service to God through his career are not behind him, but ahead of him: "My wife and I are turning sixty next year. When I was young, this sounded old, but I believe my opportunities for the Kingdom are great. In our culture we hear things like 'slowing down' and 'retirement'. Yet, I've gotten more involved in service in the last five years than I have my entire life."
