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I. DESCRIPTION

A practical study of cross-cultural church planting in tribal, peasant, and urban societies, emphasizing the biblical basis and New Testament patterns as well as modern practices and relevant research on the subject.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments, and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. OBJECTIVES

3. Identify some contemporary church planting strategies. (PLO 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 3, 4)
4. Demonstrate an understanding of the impact of culture and worldview on church planting strategies. (PLO 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 3, 4)
5. Develop a strategy for a cross-cultural church planting ministry in a specific culture and society of personal interest. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 1, 2, 3, 4)

III. REQUIREMENTS

1. Reading

This course consists of discussions that center on the material covered in the textbooks with additional input from the professor and outside guests. As a result, it is absolutely necessary to come having read the portion of the textbook under discussion and prepared to discuss it. Failure to complete reading assignments and therefore non-participation could result in failing the course.

2. Book Summaries

- a. Write a **5**-page summary of each of the five textbooks. The summaries will be due according to the tentative schedule.
- b. Write each summary in non-research format Turabian style. See the document, "How to write a book review."
- c. These are not summaries of the entire book but rather a summary of what you feel are the most important points per our discussion of the book and as it relates to planting a church in a cross-cultural context.

3. Forum Discussions

Each Student will participate in Forum discussions, covering topics covered in class and in the textbooks. Each Forum discussion is due according to the tentative schedule. Topics/Questions can be found under discussions in Canvas.

4. Final Project

There are no exams in this course as passing an exam on church-planting principles in no way means success in future church-planting endeavors. So instead of a final exam the students will complete a final project. This final project is to develop a strategy for planting a church among a people group of the student's choosing and different from their own culture. Students are encouraged to consider their previous papers in Cultural Anthropology and Intercultural Communication as resources.

1. The final project will be a minimum of **15** pages in length.
2. The strategy should follow everything from pre-field preparation through releasing the church to its own leadership. Therefore, it should include the following stages and what the missionaries' roles and responsibilities will be in each stage.
 - a. Pre-field preparation
 - b. Deploying to the field (including practical living considerations)
 - c. Making initial contact.
 - d. Communicating the Gospel in the cultural context.
 - e. Making Disciples
 - f. Training Leaders
 - g. Handing the church off to national leadership.
 - h. Ongoing follow up/relationship.

IV. METHODS

- A. In-class methods:** listening to lectures, participating in class discussions, and writing.
- B. Out-of-class methods:** reading, writing, research.

- C.** The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
- D.** All class papers must follow the Turabian style according to *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition. Unless otherwise indicated book reports and study questions may be in non-research format, interviews and other research papers should be in research paper format. A copy of the Turabian Style Guide is available on the Clark Academic Center page of Calvary's website.
- E. Late Assignments:** Assignments will be penalized according to the professor's late policy as explained in Canvas.
- F. Plagiarism:** Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's or AI entity's ideas or constructs and presenting them as your own. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. Most assignments at Calvary require the student to produce original work. Therefore, unless specifically permitted by the instructor, the use of AI-generated content is prohibited (even if cited) as it does not represent original work created by the student and is an unreliable aggregate of ideas from other sources.
