I. DESCRIPTION

A practical study of writing techniques for vocal ensembles. Includes arranging, composing, and adapting music for a variety of types of vocal ensembles.

*This is a blended class, meaning that both campus students and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom.

- D. Longer choral piece projects. The student will complete the longer choral piece projects as assigned.
