I. DESCRIPTION

A survey and biblical analysis of a broad range of theological issues relevant to local church ministry in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Classical liberalism, neo-orthodoxy, and neo-evangelicalism are studied as a backdrop to a more detailed evaluation of more recent theological systems, movements, and issues that impact the church in both American and international contexts. (Prerequisite: BI115)

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments, and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. OBJECTIVES

- 3. Grow in appreciation for the role of the Bible in developing theology (PLO 1, 2, 5) (A1-3)
- 4. Gain experience analyzing contemporary theological expressions of early 21st century American (PLO 1, 2, 5) (A 1-6)

III. REQUIREMENTS

1. Reading

Read the assigned portion of the textbook, *Theologies of the 21st Century*. There is a schedule of readings due each week in "Modules" in Canvas. This assignment will be submitted along with the reading reflections below.

Read the assigned portion of the textbook, *Contemporary Theology: An Introduction*. There is a schedule of readings due each week in "Modules" in Canvas. This assignment will be submitted along with the reading reflections below.

2. Reading Reflection

Each week the student will write a 2-page paper on the reading for that week. Additional instructions may be found in Canvas.

3. Discussion Questions

Each week the student will respond to a discussion question in Canvas. More instructions are available in Canvas. Students should first respond to the question themselves and then respond to another student for full credit.

4. Final Paper / Project

Each student will submit a final project/research paper equivalent to 15 pages, double spaced Turabian research format. The project may be a formal research paper on a contemporary theology topic, a set of lesson plans teaching a series for Sunday School or home Bible study; a series of sermons dealing with a contemporary issue facing the church; a video dealing with such an issue; or....be creative.

- **C.** The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
- **D.** All class papers must follow the Turabian style according to *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition. Unless otherwise indicated book reports and study questions may be in non-research format, interviews and other research papers should be in research paper format. A copy of the Turabian Style Guide is available on the Clark Academic Center page of Calvary's website.
- **E. Late Assignments**: Assignments will be penalized according to the professor's late policy as explained in Canvas.
- **F. Plagiarism**: Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's or AI entity's ideas or constructs and presenting them as your own. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. Most assignments at Calvary require the student to produce original work.
