DESCRIPTION

This course surveys what the Bible teaches about the Bible, God, man and sin (Bibliology, Theology Proper, Biblical Anthropology and Hamartiology). [ILOs #1, 2, 3]

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for inperson attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Explain orthodox Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, and Hamartiology from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9).
- 2. Defend orthodox Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, and Hamartiology from aberrant understandings (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9).
- 3. Articulate the practical life implications of orthodox Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, and Hamartiology (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 1, 2).

Specific competencies to be achieved. You will:

- 1. Interact with significant texts articulating orthodox Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, and Hamartiology (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 4, 7, 8).
- 2. Articulate the orthodox Christian understanding of selected topics in Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, and Hamartiology (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 1).
- 3. Defend he orthodox Christian understanding of a selected topic in Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, or Hamartiology (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 3).
- 4. Articulate personal understanding of Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, Anthropology, and Hamartiology (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 5, 6, 8, 9).
- 5. Articulate practical, real-life application of the traditional Christian Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, or Soteriology (PLO- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 1, 2).

TEXTBOOKS

- BIBLE The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
- TEXTBOOKS -- You will only read 2 select the 2 volumes which would be of most benefit to you! These texts are background reading for our discussions, and the assignments you do for your selected volumes are to answer questions I ask about the content of the volumes you select. While I encourage you to have all of these volumes in your personal libraries, you only need 2 of them for your use for this course.

ASSIGNMENTS

- #1 Topic Introductions: Select 3 of the topics to be discussed in class and prepare 3-5 to 7 minute introductions to each topic for the 3 days those topics are to be discussed in class Include in you introduction the following: (1) a brief intro of yourself (only in your 1st presentation), (2) a definition of the topic, (3) a key passage in which the definition is seen with a brief explanation of the passage, (4) how this topic is misunderstood / distorted / confused by unbelievers and some believers today, and (5) a significant question concerning this topic (25 points each, 75 total).
- #2 Topic Discussions: Respond to each week's topic discussion with a 150-word statement of the practical implications of the week's topics – personally and in ministry to others, both unbelievers and believers (15 points each week, 120 points total).
- #3 Write a Research Essay: Write a Research Essay of at least 3500 words on one of the following topics. The paper must follow the Turabian Style Guide, include Scripture references (but not extensive quotations), and include 10 sources and footnotes (200 points).

- Defend the normative hermeneutic (historical, grammatical, literal) and compare and contrast it with the allegorical and anagogical hermeneutics.
- Describe the various views of the NT use of the OT and defend the view you believe is correct.
- Defend the biblical understanding of the Trinity and compare and contrast it with Modalism and Sabellianism.
- Describe the subordination of the Son and explain and defend the position you hold as to whether that subordination was merely temporal (just during the time of the Incarnation) or that it is eternal.
- Defend the historical view of Adam and compare and contrast that view with those views which hold that Adam was merely a literary figure.
- Defend your understanding of the nature of people and compare and contrast that view with those who believe that homosexuality and transgenderism are biblical.
- Defend your understanding of sin and compare and contrast that view with the Roman Catholic understanding of sin (mortal and venial).

Defend your understanding of the "sin unto death" (1 John 5:16) / "unpardonable sin" (Mark 3:28) / "a number are asleep" (1 Cor. 11:30).

- **#4 Textbook #1 Reading & Questions**: Read selected textbook #1 and answer 10 questions on the volume (100 points).
- **#5 Doctrinal Statement #1**: Write a 3-page Non-Research essay summarizing your doctrinal beliefs about biblical Bibliology (the Doctrine of Scripture) (75 points).
- **#6 Doctrinal Statement #2**: Write a 3-page Non-Research essay summarizing your doctrinal beliefs about biblical theology proper (the doctrine of God) (75 points).
- **#7 Textbook #2 Reading & Questions**: Read selected textbook #2 and answer 10 questions on the volume (100 points).
- **#8 Doctrinal Statement #3**: Write a 3-page Non-Research essay summarizing your doctrinal beliefs about biblical Anthropology (the doctrine of People) (75 points).
- **#9 Doctrinal Statement #4**: Write a 3-page Non-Research essay summarizing your doctrinal beliefs about biblical hamartiology (the doctrine of Sin) (75 points).
