DESCRIPTION

This course surveys what the Bible teaches about the person and work of Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit (Christology, soteriology and pneumatology).

This course is offered online only. Online students attend the classes via the online classroom in Microsoft Teams. If they cannot attend a certain night, they will be responsible for viewing the course lecture later in the week after it is uploaded to the class.

OBJECTIVES

General competencies to be achieved:

1. Explain and defend Christology from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
2. Explain and defend soteriology from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 2, 4, 6)
3. Explain and defend pneumatology from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 3, 4, 6)

Specific competencies to be achieved:

1. Explain the hypostatic union and give arguments for the deity and humanity of Christ. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
2. Give biblical arguments for the virgin birth and the sinless life of Christ. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
3. Explain the different views of the atonement. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
4. Explain and defend the substitutionary atonement of Christ on the cross. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)

5. Explain the finished work of Christ on the cross (redemption, reconciliation, propitiation). (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
6. Give arguments from the Bible for the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
7. Explain the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 1, 4, 6)
8. Defend salvation by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 2, 4, 6)
9. Give arguments for eternal security (once saved, always saved) from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 2, 4, 6)
10. Explain the similarities and differences between Free Grace Theology and Lordship Salvation. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 2, 4, 6)
11. Defend the deity and personality of the Holy Spirit from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 3, 4, 6)
12. Explain the difference between the baptism and filling of the Holy Spirit from the Bible. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 3, 4, 6)
13. Define each of the spiritual gifts listed in the New Testament. (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 3, 4, 6)
14. Give biblical reasons for cessationism (the biblical gifts of tongues, miracles, and healing are not for the Church today). (PLOs 1–3; Assignments 3, 4, 6)

TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. For assignments and research, students should use an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence—meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages. This includes any of the following: New American Standard Bible (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James Version (NKJV), or King James Version (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (paraphrases and thought-for-thought translations like the NLT and NIV) may be used as supplemental sources.

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1: Christology Questions

Download the document in Canvas and answer questions on Christology based on the reading in *Jesus Christ our Lord* by Walvoord. Be thorough in your responses, citing both Scripture and the book. Submit the completed document in Canvas. 200 points

Assignment 2: Soteriology Questions

Download the document in Canvas and answer questions on soteriology based on the reading in *Freely By His Grace* by Hixson, Whitmire, and Zuck. Be thorough in your responses, citing both Scripture and the book. Submit the completed document in Canvas. 200 points

Assignment 3: Pneumatology Questions

Download the document in Canvas and answer questions on pneumatology based on the reading in *The Holy Spirit* by Gromacki. Be thorough in your responses, citing both Scripture and the book. Submit the completed document in Canvas. 200 points

Assignment 4: Teaching Theology

Download the document in Canvas and execute three teaching opportunities to demonstrate knowledge, proficiency, and the ability to disciple others in the areas of Christology, soteriology, and pneumatology. Submit the completed document in Canvas. 120 points

Assignment 5: Attendance Report

Download the document in Canvas and complete one section after each class session. Submit the completed document in Canvas. 80 points

All class papers must follow the Turabian style according to *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition (with footnotes).

Please refer to a minimum of six sources, including two books, two journal articles, and two scholarly websites. Do not use Wikipedia, blogs, or non-academic websites.

Do not plagiarize. Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's ideas or constructs (including an AI entity's ideas or constructs) and presenting them as your own. The use of AI-generated content in student work is prohibited (even if cited) as it does not represent original work created by the student and is an unreliable aggregate of ideas from other sources. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated.
