I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will include all aspects of youth ministry, including local church, parachurch and Christian camping. A biblical philosophy as well as practical methods for youth ministry will be studied. An analysis of various programs will be considered. The diversity of youth as well as their different developmental stages will be examined. Vocational opportunities and practical life experience in youth ministries will be discussed.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 4. Develop a basic philosophy toward Youth Ministry. (PLO 2, 3, 4, 5) (A A, B, C, D, E)

III. TEXTBOOKS FOR THE COURSE

- A. The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

IV. COURSE ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

A. Study the Scriptures toward the development of the Biblical theology of youth ministry. Students will study key passages of the Bible both through individual study, in-class and online discussions, documenting study through response papers (200 points).

- B. Read the textbook toward the development of a Biblical philosophy of youth ministry. Students will read the course textbook (*Four Views*) and analyze using assigned criteria provided via Canvas for the purpose of developing personal convictions regarding the principles and methods of youth ministry (200 points).
- C. Research contemporary "voices" (in addition to the textbook authors) to determine the contemporary conversation regarding the principles and methods of youth ministry (200 points).
 - 1. Students will research to identify 10 leaders, writers, speakers or ministries (not necessarily individuals) the student believes are important voices addressing the principles and methods of youth ministry early in the 21st century.
 - 2. Students will list the 10 "voices" (names, ministries), a few resources produced (books, blogs, films, etc.), and include a few paragraphs explaining why each voice is significant.
- D. Interview three local church leaders regarding youth ministry (200 points).
 - 1. The first step in this project will be to identify three local church leaders to interview, then provide details to the professor via Canvas. Preferably, the student will choose three leaders who have different perspectives regarding the principles and methods of youth ministry.
 - 2. The second step in this project will be the development of at least 20 questions to be asked in the interviews—questions should focus on principles and methods of youth ministry (Note: the textbook and classroom discussions will help with this project).
 - 3. The third step in this project will be to conduct the interviews (in person or online), asking at least the questions developed in the second step, then document those conversations in summary form, then analyze and document lessons learned.
- E. Develop a Personal Philosophy of Youth Ministry (200 points).
 - 1. Students will write a minimum 10-page paper stating a personal philosophy of youth ministry, pulling together the study and research done in the entire course, focusing on both the principles and methods of a Biblical youth ministry.
 - 2. Students will prepare a 10-15-minute presentation to creatively share their personal philosophy of youth ministry. This will be a summary of the 10-page paper using video, audio, PowerPoint, skits, art, music, etc., to help communicate what they believe about youth ministry.
