I. DESCRIPTION

A study of selected major religious/cults influencing America and the world. Comparisons are made between their doctrinal tenets and those of revealed biblical truth. The practical concern of this course is to help the student discern truth from error in these religious systems and to effectively teach and witness with an adequate understanding of their beliefs and with tact and kindness reflecting the love of Christ. (Prerequisite RP100).

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments, and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved:

- 1. Understand the basic history and teaching of world religions and cults. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 4, 5)
- Understand how the theologies of the religions and cults compare to the essential features of historical biblical Christianity. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)

B. Specific competencies to be achieved:

- 1. Identify the positive and negative features of the belief systems studies in class. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
- 2. Describe, compare, and contrast the various belief systems studied. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 2, 3, 4, 5)
- Begin to learn to defend biblical Christianity in the primary areas of theology in which it differs from the belief systems studied. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 2, 3, 4, 5)
- 4. Receive ideas/suggestions for reaching out in witness to each group studied. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)

III. REQUIREMENTS

1. Reading

Read both textbooks according to the schedule for the subjects covered. The whole textbook must be completed by the end of the course. The student will write a 5-page review of each textbook. Summarizing key lessons from each religious system from the book. See Canvas for more details, non-research Turabian format. See also, the document in Canvas, "How to Write a Book Review."

2. Study Questions

Prior to each class session students will answer the set of study questions for the particular religion under examination. Study questions can be found in Canvas.

3. Forum Discussions

Following each class session, all students, are to return to Canvas and give 3 key differences between the religion studied and biblical Christianity. Students should give their own response as well as comment on the response of $\underline{2}$ other students for full credit.

4. Religious Interview

Students will choose one of the religions covered in class and interview an adherent to that particular religion. Example questions are given in Canvas with this assignment. Students should be careful to choose a religion so that they can reasonably find someone to interview. The professor can help with locating someone. Based on the interview, write a 5-page response where you cover, the religion in question, responses to the questions, additional insights gained from talking with someone who holds this belief system, as well as biblical arguments either for or against that religion.

5. Final Project

For the final project, the student with choose one of the religions covered in class (can be the same as your interview). Then either write a 10-page research paper going deeper into this belief system or create a video presentation to be used in a classroom or church setting where you teach other believers about this religion. Be sure to cover the following.

- Underlying worldview
- Particular beliefs and practices
- Where this religion is most commonly found including number of adherents and any branches (denominations)
- Arguments for or against it
- Relationship to Christianity
- How would you share the Gospel with an adherent of this religion?

Additional instructions and formatting/rubric are in Canvas.

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IV. METHODS

- **A. In-class methods:** listening to lectures, participating in class discussions, writing, and taking tests.
- **B. Out-of-class methods:** reading, writing, research, and studying for tests.

- **C.** The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
- **D.** All class papers must follow the Turabian style according to *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition. Unless otherwise indicated book reports and study questions may be in non-research format, interviews and other research papers should be in research paper format. A copy of the Turabian Style Guide is available on the Clark Academic Center page of Calvary's website.
- **E. Late Assignments**: Assignments will be penalized according to the professor's late policy as explained in Canvas.
- **F. Plagiarism**: Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's or AI entity's ideas or constructs and presenting them as your own. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. Most assignments at Calvary require the student to produce original work. Therefore, unless specifically permitted by the instructor, the use of AI-generated content is prohibited (even if cited) as it does not represent original work created by the student and is an unreliable aggregate of ideas from other sources. AI, however, may be utilized in cases where the instructor has explicitly permitted its use to accomplish specific tasks. If there are any questions as to the permissibility of AI use for an assignment, please ask your instructor for clarification.

Any assignment that includes plagiarism will receive a zero (0) grade. Students should note that papers will be submitted in Canvas via "Turn-It-In". This program automatically gives the student's work a plagiarism score, students should strive for a score less than 20.
